

From the Pastor...

I recently had the opportunity to experience the musical *Les Misérables* at the Fox Theater in St. Louis for the second time. I have also seen the movie version and have read the book by Victor Hugo that inspired the musical. It is a story that is compelling because of the humanity of its' characters and how their decisions impact many lives. It is also a story that reminds us of redemption, forgiveness, second chances and finding peace in the midst of difficulty. It is a story about mercy and justice and is reflective of our faith and the story of God's work found in the Bible.

Lent begins on February 22nd and ends with Easter. It is a season of the church year where we reflect on the decisions of our lives and seek forgiveness and restoration for our failings and seek the peace that is promised by God, the "peace that passes all understanding." This Lenten season we are going to be looking at God's grace in our lives through the story and characters of Les Miserable. I will be doing a six week sermon series that focuses on the themes found in Les Misérables - grace, justice, poverty, revolution, love and hope.

In addition to the sermon series, there will also be a six week Lenten study on Monday evenings at 6:30 at Rainbow House. We will be using the materials developed by United Methodist Pastor Matt Rawle entitled *The Grace of Les Miserable*. Whether you are familiar with the story or not, I believe this study will ask a lot of questions about the difficulties we find in life and help find peace in the midst of these difficulties. 


Rainbow House Team Forming

It has been 3 years since Immanuel UMC became a Reconciling Ministries congregation. As a result, we have had the opportunity to open our doors to many people and to take the message of God's inclusive love to our community. One of the ways we do that is through Rainbow House. Each month Rainbow House hosts groups for LGBTQ+ adults and youth as well as for parents, friends and allies (PFLAG). It also partners with other community organizations to promote justice and inclusion.

While we have many people from our community that volunteer at Rainbow House, I think it is vital that Immanuel continues to oversee its mission. The church council has given approval to setting up a Rainbow House Team to help with this oversight. What that looks like and how the team functions will be determined by those who are a part of it. If you are interested in working together with others to develop and implement a plan to create safe space for the LGBTQ community and to help change the narrative that people have to choose between their faith and identity, then this is the place for you. Ash Wednesday-February 22

Ash Wednesday is the first day of the season of Lent, a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. Although Ash Wednesday has ancient roots, it does not appear in the rituals of The United Methodist Church or our predecessor denominations until the 20th century. Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Through the service of ashes on the first day of Lent, we come before God recognizing our humanity, repenting of our sin, and remembering who we are and who we can be. We pray you will join us for worship on Wednesday, February 22 beginning at 6:30 pm.
